The Pearl Fincher Museum of Fine Art is also hosting a Family Day at the museum on December 6. They will have activities coordinating with their exhibition "State of Grace."










The Barbara Bush Library Friends support two events in our community


Spotlight on Local Author

E. R. Webb Saturday, November 15 2 - 4 p.m.

The Barbara Bush Public Library is pleased to present local author E. R. Webb in an open forum, Spotlight on Local Authors session on Saturday November 15 from 2:00-4:00pm at the library. Mr. Webb will be signing

books and discussing his two mystery-thriller novels Gemini's Cross and The Pallium Project published by Tate Publishing. There will be a question and answer period related to the novels along with a discussion with aspiring authors regarding the rigors of getting published. Webb and his wife Vicki are parents of four grown children, grandparents of nine and great-grandparents of four. Webb is currently writing his third novel, The Beginning of Sorrows.

particular point in their lives.

For example, as a retired engineer, Al used that experience to help Julian Sosa, a civil engineer in his native country, learn the English necessary to eventually manage an office on FM 1960 for an engineering firm.

"The English that I know is thanks to him," says Julian Sosa, one of more than 100 adults that Al has assisted in English. Julian joined Al's class one month after coming to the United States from Columbia in 2003, knowing only some words.

Now Julian communicates with clients in Latin America using his Spanish, but also speaks regularly with customers in the Caribbean islands and in the United States. Al gave him articles and books to read in order to help him learn the vocabulary and knowledge to build a career in engineering here in the United States.

"He was like a university teacher to me," Julian says. "I have no idea what I'd be doing now without his help."

Al has helped students in several careers, building special vocabularies necessary for areas such as welding, helping students with practice interviewing, and helping them to pass exams for careers in the United States. However, students have asked him for help with many other harriers involving language, customs or resources, such as how to

barriers involving language, customs or resources, such as how to buy a good refrigerator and how to take defensive driving.

In addition to two ESL classes on Tuesdays at Barbara Bush Branch Library, Al teaches a German class on Mondays and a Spanish class on Friday. He has frequently taught a class at Doss Community Center near Beltway 8. Last spring, it became a class in which many of the students were learning various other European languages. While Al was familiar with some of the languages because of his work experience in Europe, the class relied on other students' knowledge and a travel book translated into six languages.

It's not surprising that Al's own experience learning language goes back to age 11, when his grandfather started teaching him German. Al continued learning German in the army as a newsreel photographer in Germany during the 1950s. He also lived in Germany and other countries in Europe for several years working as a chemical engineer, and in Puerto Rico for more than six years.



In addition to teaching, Al has shared his experience at training sessions and in-services, mentors new tutors, and shares teaching materials that he has prepared.

"He takes great pride in the success of his students and has given up many Saturdays to help a student prepare for a life-changing career move," says Nancy Pearsall, reference assistant and ESL coordinator at Barbara Bush Branch Library. "His high standards, work ethic and compassion make him a role model for all of us."

Over two thousand students from 105 third grade classes in the Klein ISD visited the library and other cultural district sites during the first two weeks of October. For many students, this was their first introduction to a library, a musical production, and a museum. The logistics were daunting, but the rewards were outstanding. The children and teachers had a fun and exciting "Art Day" field trip, and learned a lot about the cultural treasures available to them right here in our own community.
